

WASHINGTON'S CHILD CARE CRISIS

The cost of high-quality early learning and child care is simply too high and too hard to find for many families. It's estimated more than 600,000 kids in Washington who are in need of care because all available parents are working are not currently getting state licensed child care.1 We know that 90 percent of a child's brain develops by age five, and high quality early childhood experiences like child care lay the groundwork for success in school and in life.

Washington's lack of child care and early learning options is bad for our economy. When parents don't have a stable, safe, reliable and affordable place to take their children while they work, they're forced to miss shifts and lose income, or leave the workforce altogether. With more parents pushed out of the workforce or earning less, that means fewer people with less money to spend in their local communities, and our entire economy suffers.


